A WORD FROM THE CHAIR

MOVING FORWARD

With the significant milestone of the 12 month anniversary of the 2009 bushfires now past, communities can continue to move forward in the knowledge they've achieved a significant amount and set the important foundations for their future.

The VBRRA 12 month report, which is now available at www.wewillrebuild.vic.gov.au, outlines this progress and the achievements made across Victoria since last February.

The clean-up of more than 3,000 damaged or destroyed properties, the issuing of more than 1500 building permits, and the funding of more than 260 community projects has paved the way for the rebuilding and recovery of the 107 communities impacted by the fires.

With important projects now underway such as the Callignee Community Centre, the stage two development of the Marysville Health, Learning and Recreation Hub and the urban design framework for the Kinglake Ranges, Flowerdale and Toolangi, important steps are being made in rebuilding communities.

While there will continue to be challenges over the next 12 months and into the future, we are making progress and together we will look forward to more projects coming to fruition as we rebuild.

VICTORIAN BUSHFIRE CASE MANAGEMENT SERVICE STILL OPEN

Individuals and families can continue to access case management support and the service will work long-term with those who require it.

People can contact the Case Management Service by calling **1800 050 400**. The service will operate for two years, from February 2009 to February 2011.

VBRA NEEDS-BASED DONATION MANAGEMENT SYSTEM TO CONCLUDE ON 26 FEBRUARY

The donations management system will be concluding on **February 26 2010**, as most donations will have been distributed to fire-affected individuals and families by this date.

Any bushfire-affected person who was approved for or received a grant from the Victorian Bushfire Appeal Fund has been able to access donations under the system, with each household given 1000 points to use on these high-value donations.

Most donations have now been distributed but there are still a number of Panasonic and Tupperware packs and Ikea shopping vouchers available.

Individuals and families that haven’t used their points are encouraged to get in contact with their local Donations Coordinator or Case Manager before February 26 to access remaining donations.

COMMENT INVITED ON MARYSVILLE HUB

Concept plans for stage two of the \$7 million Marysville Community Learning, Health and Recreation Hub have been released and are available for public comment until March 5.

Plans include a multi-purpose community centre, indoor recreation centre and community health service.

A community briefing and feedback session will be held at the joint Marysville and Triangle Community Recovery Committee and Marysville and Triangle Development Group community meeting at the Marysville Golf Club on 28 February at 4pm.

MURCHISON STREET AND TOWN AMENITY PROJECT

The *Rebuilding Together Plan* for bushfire reconstruction and recovery allocated funding to undertake planning and design for the restoration of Murchison Street, Marysville's main street, as well as other areas in the centre of the town.

The design stage will be undertaken collaboratively with the community to produce detailed landscaping and construction plans. **A workshop is being held to discuss the project at Marysville Golf Club on 24 February at 6pm.**

HAZARDOUS TREES PAYMENT EXTENDED

The Victorian Bushfire Appeal Fund has extended the closing date for applications for the Safe Removal of Hazardous Trees payment to June 30, 2010.

The Fund recognises that many people are experiencing difficulty in obtaining an aborist's report and that additional time will allow people to gather the necessary documentation to apply for the payment.

The \$4000 payment has been made available to help residents meet the cost of assessing and removing hazardous trees on their private properties.

INFORMATION SESSION FOR CONSTRUCTION WORKERS IN MURRINDINDI

All levels of government, the Industry Capability Network Victoria and the private sector are joining up to host an information session in Murrindindi Shire for tradespeople and those in the broader construction industry.

Attendees at this session will be provided with:

- details of building and construction projects underway and planned for the area
- practical information on how to compete for work arising from the projects in the area
- information on the support available to businesses, employers and their employees.

KINGLAKE RANGES, FLOWERDALE AND TOOLANGI DESIGN FRAMEWORK MOVES AHEAD

Tenders are being invited for a consultant team to develop a comprehensive plan and local area urban design frameworks to plan for, and guide, the long-term development and recovery of the communities of Kinglake Ranges, Flowerdale and Toolangi.

This \$500,000 planning initiative, funded by the Federal and Victorian Governments, will be undertaken by the Authority in partnership with Murrindindi Shire Council and the local Community Recovery Committees.

Tenders close on Thursday 11 March 2010.

MATERIAL AID STILL AVAILABLE

Material aid continues to be available to bushfire-affected residents, with approximately 9 per cent of the 21,000 pallets of donated goods still available.

The majority of remaining material aid includes second hand clothing, used books, toiletries, blankets and bed linen. There are also limited amounts of second hand couches. There is no remaining stock of nappies, pillows or quilt covers.

This material, which was donated by the public in the aftermath of the fires last February, has been managed and distributed by VBRRA through the Clayton Warehouse, regional distribution points in Marysville and Pheasant Creek and by other agencies such as the Salvos and St Vinnies.

Blue referral card holders can access the remaining material aid from the following locations: the Kinglake Neighbourhood House, Clayton warehouse, Marysville, Pheasant Creek, Hurstbridge Relief Centre and Diamond Valley Baptist Church.

FREE REBUILDING ADVICE CONTINUES

The free Mobile Building Advisory Service is continuing to provide expert advice and information to help with all aspects of rebuilding homes and businesses damaged or destroyed in last year's fires.

Building advisers are available face-to-face or over the phone and operate from Community Service Hubs across all bushfire affected areas.

Here's some frequently asked rebuilding questions and answers.

Floor plans

Q. When someone wanting to rebuild gives their 'wish list' for a floor plan to a builder, who 'owns' the work?

A. If you use a building company to draft plans for a new house, usually the company or builder owns the plans. If you employ an architect or drafts person to draw up plans, then usually you own them. Above all else, it's vital to agree with a builder or anyone else what you are getting for your money and ensure it's in writing. If in doubt, the Rebuilding Advisory team can give you some helpful advice *before* you start.

Q. Should a person rebuilding pay for work done without having a signed contract? (ie. what is the process for having plans drafted etc.)

A. When dealing with plans or drawings it's best to get a quote before you commit to any work being done. Ensure you are clear *exactly* what you are paying for in writing.

Water

Q. I have lived on the mountain for many years and our only water source is rainwater and tanks. Since the fires I have considered sinking a bore. The water will be used for our garden and firefighting, and not for drinking purposes. People have told me I require permission from water companies to sink the bore and that it will be expensive. How do I find the right person to sink the bore and what sort of costs are involved? Is there a lot of guess work to find the water?

A. If you're thinking about bore water options either go to a specialist supplier or contact your local council. You do need permits and it will cost you money to have a bore dug and to cover ongoing costs. Costs really depend on where you live and access and availability to supply.

COMMUNITY SERVICE HUBS TO CLOSE ON CODE RED DAYS

Community Service Hubs managed by the Department of Human Services will be closed when a Code Red Fire Danger day has been announced in their relevant Fire Danger Rating District.

Consistent with Victorian government policy, the decision to implement hub closures on days declared to be Code Red is the safest option for staff and the local community. The Code Red warnings are likely to be made three days in advance.

Once the final decision to close a hub is confirmed the decision will not to change. This is regardless of any subsequent change in the weather forecast.

TELSTRA INFORMATION DAY AT KINGLAKE

RECOVERY THROUGH ART AND PLAY

NEW PARENTING SUPPORT PROGRAM

Parenting Children and Teenagers Affected by Bushfire is a new practical parenting program for mothers, fathers and carers of children and teenagers affected by the 2009 Victorian bushfires.

It is a free, six-session program that will be run in small supportive groups by local organisations in conjunction with the Parenting Research Centre. Childcare will be available and light refreshments provided.

The program will help parents and carers manage stress and anxiety, assist their children by gaining skills and confidence and support their family's recovery. Programs will be held in locations around Victoria during 2010, when and where families ask for them.

The first program is commencing 22 February in Kinglake.

SHARING EXPERIENCES WITH OTHER VOLUNTEERS

Those who volunteered in the aftermath of the bushfires and feel their mental or emotional wellbeing may have been affected by their experiences, can now access free group debrief sessions.

The sessions are provided by Whittlesea Community Connections and Austin Health, and can help reduce isolation by providing an opportunity for people to share stories, experiences, issues and problems.

Austin Health Psychological Trauma Recovery Service can offer up to two free sessions for volunteers and can also offer group information sessions about the effects of trauma and treatment issues.
